HOW TO HUNT SAFELY IN BEAR COUNTRY

Grizzly and black bears can be found in much of the Blackfeet Reservation. In recent years grizzly bear populations have been expanding eastward and can now be found in areas where they have long been absent.

Be aware that the act of hunting puts you at risk of encountering bears and that elk bugling, game calls, and cover scents may attract bears.

If you hunt alone in bear country let someone know your detailed plans and have a way to periodically check in. Hunting partners should share details of their hunt plans and have a check in or communication system.

While hunting in bear country, pay attention to fresh bear sign. Look for bear tracks, scat, digs, a carcass and concentrations of natural foods, such as berries. Use caution when hunting areas that have evidence of bear activity or areas where you see scavenging birds such as magpies, ravens or crows – there may be a carcass nearby.

Communicate with other hunters and let them know when bears have been seen and/or fresh sign has been observed.

WHAT TO DO IF YOU ENCOUNTER A BEAR

The mere presence of a bear does not always pose a risk. When in close proximity to people, most bears become aware of human presence and leave the area. If you encounter a bear, assess the situation, stay calm and **do not run**. Decide if the bear is aware of you or if it is fleeing or unaware. Keep the bear in sight and back away and leave the area. Occasionally bears will approach you when you are leaving, so be cautious.

When hunting in bear country, it is recommended that every hunter carry bear pepper spray. Pepper spray has been proven to be more effective than firearms at stopping a grizzly bear charge. Keep the bear pepper spray within reach and be familiar with the firing mechanism. In sudden encounters with grizzly bears, bear pepper spray has proven to be a valuable tool for deterring attacks. Grizzly bears sprayed in the face at very close range often stop attacking and are less likely to inflict serious injury.

Most bear attacks are prompted by inadvertently running into a female with young, surprising a bear at close range or near a carcass. It is recommended that hunters mentally rehearse a worst-case scenario with bears. If the mind has never been there before, the body does not know how to respond.

Use a weapon only if bear pepper spray is unavailable. Be aware that bears wounded with an arrow, knife or firearm may intensify the level of attack.

As a last resort, if physically attacked, play dead. Lie down, covering your neck and head with your hands and arms. If you have a backpack leave it on to protect your back. Stay face down never look at the bear and remain still until the bear is long gone. Many people have survived bear attacks using this method.

SAFEGUARDS FOR RETRIEVING GAME MEAT OUT OF BEAR COUNTRY

When hunting in bear country, the golden rule is to get that elk or deer out of the area as quickly as possible. The longer a carcass remains laying on the ground, hung up in hunting camp, or in the back of a truck, the more likely it will be discovered by a bear. The sooner elk or deer are taken home and butchered, the better.

Some bears may move towards gunshots because they have learned to associate hunting activities with gut piles or animal carcasses.

Carcasses left out for a period of time require special precautions. Carry a colored, lightweight tarp or space blanket. Put the guts on the tarp and drag them as far away from the carcass as possible. Then use the tarp to cover the carcass. This will reduce the scent trail from the gut pile to the carcass and discourage scavengers' attention to the carcass. Hang clothing or other items at the sight to keep animals away. Locate an observation point 200 yards (if possible) away from the carcass with clear line of sight. **Before leaving**, walk to the observation point and memorize the site.

When returning, approach the carcass carefully. Yell or whistle repeatedly. With binoculars study the scene from the observation point and scan the area for the carcass and any movement. If a bear is at the site and refuses to leave or the meat has been covered by a bear and is not salvageable, leave immediately and report the incident to Blackfeet Fish and Wildlife. You may receive a replacement tag. Do not attempt to frighten away or haze a bear that does not leave a carcass when it becomes aware of you.

If you live in bear country, do not hang carcasses behind the house or in the garbage for extended periods. Big game carcasses stored outside should be hung from a pulley attached to a stout "meat pole" that is at least 25 feet off the ground. The lowest portion of the elk or deer should swing from the center of the pole and at least 10 feet off the ground. Bears have been known to climb trees and stand on objects in order to reach food. For more information on how to install a "meat pole" contact Fish and Game.

Bears are opportunists and change their behavior in order to take advantage of new food sources. So if you are hunting or living in bear country, make sure your camps, cabins and homes are 'bear-proof' and that items that may attract bears such as carcasses, garbage and/or pet, livestock or bird food are unavailable or contained.

HUNTING REGULATIONS
2016

1. Big Game must be tagged immediately after kill and tag must be notched out before being transported. 3-7-M
2. A person whose tag is attached to a big game animal must be present while the animal is being transported from the field. 3-7-M (1)
3. Big Game Tags/Special Permits are non-transferable and non-refundable. 3-7-M (2)
4. Non-Members with special number spouse big game permits may hunt in Zone2, 2A East and 2AWest, and Zone 3, but only during the time in which hunting season is open. 4-2-E
5. Harassment or driving of big game animals by any means will be prohibited. Violators will be fined \$300.00. 3-9-G
6. Only Tribal Members and Descendants are allowed to gather, retrieve or hunt antlers and mushrooms on the Blackfeet Indian Reservation. Non-Members are prohibited and violators will be fined \$300.00.
7. A Transport Permit is required for meat. An Export Permit is needed for Antlers, Heads, & Furs. (Animal Parts) 3-3-A
8. All Hunters shall make food, including garbage and livestock food, (excluding Hay) unavailable to bears. 3-17-B
9. During daylight hours all camps should be attended or food shall be stored in a bear resistant manner. 3-17-B
10. During nighttime while camping, all food not in use or being prepared shall be stored in a bear resistant manner. 3-17-B
11. Big Game gut piles shall be removed at least 100 yards from any camp or designed hiking trail. 3-17-E
12. Big Game carcasses should be removed from the field as soon as possible. If left overnight, carcasses should be stored in a bear resistant manner if possible. 3-17-F
13. If a grizzly bear claims a hunter's big game carcass, the hunter should contact a Tribal Game Warden. Upon investigation the hunter may be issued a replacement tag. 3-7-F
14. Special Lottery Tag Moose and Elk that are taken by hunters MUST be inspected by a Tribal Game Warden. This is for the purpose of identification of sex and age. (No Exceptions). 3-7-G

15. Hunter must submit to a game inspection at check stops set up by Game Wardens. 11-13
16. To get from one staging area to another in Zone 2A, hunters cannot drive through; they are required to drive around the perimeter. FWA-1-B-(1)
17. Zone 2A west is restricted to foot and horseback traffic only. FWA-1-A-(3)
18. Zone 2A east is restricted to foot and horseback traffic. This Zone is a designed hunting zone for the elderly and handicap which allows vehicle use. FWA-1-A-(4)
19. BOW SEASON – The use of Cross Bows for Big Game Hunting is ILLEGAL. 3-7-K (1)

NOTE: **BEAR RESISTANT MANNER** means stored in bear resistant containers, suspended at least 10 feet above ground and 4 feet from any supportive structure (tree trunk, etc.), unavailable due to human attendance, or any combination of these.

BEAR RESISTANT CONTAINER means a securable container constructed of solid material.

When secured under stress the container will not have any cracks, openings, or hinges that would allow a bear to gain entry by biting or clawing. Wood containers are not considered bear resistant unless they are reinforced with metal. Locked vehicles with closed windows are considered bear resistant.

SAFETY REMINDERS:

400 Square inches of Hunter Orange is required for all Big Game Rifle Hunters on the Blackfoot Reservation (See FWA 7A.1 (d)).

The Southern Piegan Diabetes Project advises that “walking and exercise does a body good.”

ZONE 1: OPEN TO SPECIAL PERMIT AND LOTTERY WINNERS ONLY.

ZONE 2 A: WEST IS RESTRICTED TO HORSEBACK AND WALKING FROM STAGING AREAS.

ZONE 2A: EAST IS RESTRICTED TO FOOT AND HORSEBACK ONLY FROM STAGING AREAS.

1. Elderly and Handicap tag holders can drive into Zone 2A EAST only, and will be limited to one firearm per vehicle.

ZONE 3: IS OPEN TO BIG GAME HUNTING.

1. Use of hunting tag on animal is required during general hunting season.
 - a. Mule Deer Season is October 15, 2016 to November 1, 2016.
2. No tags required after General Hunting season closes.
 - a. Animals harvested after closure of the General Hunting season must report harvest within 24 hours.
 - b. Restricted to Bull Elk and Whitetail Buck.
3. Zone 3 is closed March 1, 2017 to July 19, 2017

ZONE 4: OPEN TO BOW HUNTING SEASON ONLY

STAGING AREAS: (LABELED IN NUMBERS) REMEMBER YOU CAN'T DRIVE THRU HUNTING ZONES TO GET FROM ONE STAGING AREAS TO THE OTHER. YOU HAVE TO DRIVE ALL THE WAY AROUND ON HIGHWAY.

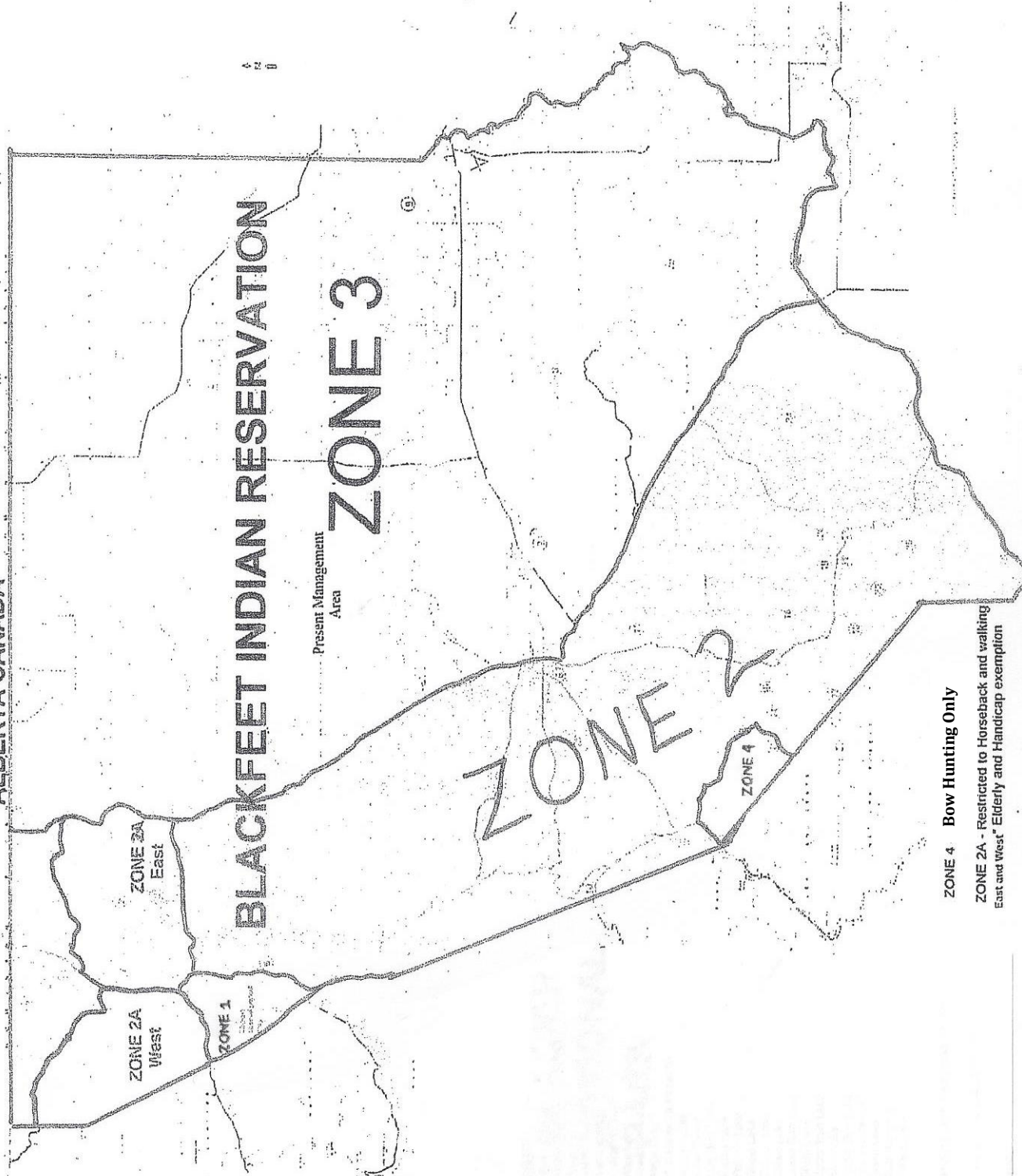
ZONE 2A WEST:

1. **Chief Mountain Road staging area:** Across the road from Burns Sawmill, Slide Lake Road by cattle guard east of Crusher Hill Pullout and approach across from Bob Fullerton's Place.
2. **Yellow Mountain Staging area:** Kennedy Creek crossing south of fence line (near Glacier National Park Boundary) and north of Tower Ridge and picnic table road intersection.
3. **Many Glacier Road Staging area:** Little Canada turnout and Camp 5 turnout.

ZONE 2A EAST:

1. **Duck Head Bay Staging area:** West end of Duck Lake just past first cattle guard.
2. **Spider Lake Staging area:** Anywhere along the canal road east of Spider Lake and west of Iron Bridge crossing on St. Mary Canal.
3. **North Fork Road Staging area:** Near the garbage bin along the road a mile north of the Duck Lake Road.
